NVAO

- Accreditation Organisation of the Netherlands and Flanders (NVAO).
- Bi-national organisation
 - Pre-funded by the Netherlands & Flanders
 - HEIs pay for procedures
- Approx. 50 FTE
- Programme accreditation and institutional audits
 - Each year about 700 procedures
 - Accreditation necessary for funding, recognition, students grants
 - 900,000 students at 4,000 programmes at 140 HEIs

European Consortium for Accreditation in higher education (ECA)

- 16 agencies from 12 European countries; founded in 2003
- Aims:
 - Mutual recognition of accreditation & QA decisions
 - Mutual learning and dissemination of good practices
 - Information on quality and facilitation of internationalisation
- Results:
 - mutual recognition agreements
 - code of good practice, QA principles, publications, projects
- New services:
 - Internationalisation Certificate
 - Coordination Point for Joint Programmes
 - Trainings

JOQAR: background

- JPs are on top of the European HE agenda
 - Stimulating mobility, international/intercultural competences, partnerships HEIs
- Estimated total number of JPs: 4,000
- Obstacles for HEIs in organising JPs
- Problems with recognition of qualifications
- Challenges in the accreditation/QA of JPs

JOQAR : essentials

- Joint programmes: Quality Assurance and Recognition of degrees awarded (JOQAR)
- ECA⁺ project (Nov. 2010 Oct. 2013)
 - 10 QA agencies + 4 ENIC-NARICs project partners; NVAO project coordinator
- EU Erasmus Mundus Action 3 funding
- Overall aim:

to ensure that joint programmes are facilitated in two specific areas: accreditation and recognition



Joint programme and degree -Definitions

- Joint programme: "An integrated curriculum coordinated and offered jointly by different HEIs and leading to a double/multiple/joint degree"
- Joint degree: "A single document awarded by HEIs offering the joint programme and nationally acknowledged as the recognised award of the joint programme"

Multiple degree - Definition

Multiple degree: "Separate degrees awarded by HEIs offering the joint programme, attesting the successful completion of this programme."

(If 2 degrees are awarded by 2 institutions, this is a "double degree")

Guidelines for Good Practice regarding the Joint Degree

- 3.1. The joint degree is awarded in accordance with the legal frameworks governing the awarding institutions and is recognised as a joint degree in the higher education systems of the awarding institutions;
- 3.2. The joint degree includes reference to all relevant (sub)national legal frameworks in accordance to which the degree was awarded;
- 3.3. References to higher education institutions (logos and/or full names) are limited to the awarding institutions/authorities, i.e. only the institutions that award this joint degree;
- 3.4. The joint degree is only signed by the competent authority/-ies representing the awarding institutions;
- 3.5. The joint degree includes the qualification's full name(s) as recognised in all the relevant legal frameworks;
- 3.6. If the consortium has agreed on one responsible institution (such as a coordinating institution or a contact point), this is indicated on the joint degree (e.g. next to the name of that institution).

- Examples can help...

3.5. The joint degree includes the qualification's full name(s) as recognised in all the relevant legal frameworks;

<u>Example:</u> If a German, a Polish and an Italian higher education institution issue a joint master's degree, it should normally include the following qualifications:

- 'Master xxx' (which is the German qualification),
- 'Magister xxx' (which is the Polish qualification) and
- 'Laurea Magistrale xxx' (which is the Italian qualification) on the joint degree.

"...looking for evidence to PROVIDE rather than DENY recognition."

"As you will learn from this document, the best way to deal with joint degrees is (a) to accept you don't need to know everything, and (b) to know when the information and/or evidence gathered is sufficient to recognise or recommend recognition."



Challenges in accreditation of JPs

- Joint programmes are confronted with different national QA regimes
- There is no single QA/accreditation procedure
- Multiple procedures, frameworks, visits, panels, reports
- Decisions may only have an influence on national system

Multilateral Agreement on the Mutual Recognition of Accreditation Results regarding Joint Programmes (MULTRA)

The signing accreditation organisations agree to apply the ECA principles for accreditation procedures regarding joint programmes;

and confirm that within their competences they accept the results of the accreditation procedures of the other signing accreditation organisations when accrediting joint programmes

MULTRA

- Signing of MULTRA possible after external review of agency and observation of procedure
- Observation report by 2 observers from MULTRA agencies: decision by MULTRA signatory agencies
- MULTRA signed by 12 agencies in Austria, Colombia, Denmark, France, Germany, Netherlands and Flanders, Poland, Spain; Costa Rica and Slovenia to follow
- Open for other agencies/countries

Single accreditation procedure

Single procedure

- Procedure by:
 - One agency
- Focus of procedure
 - Whole joint programme
- Result:
 - National accreditations in countries of JP consortium



Single accreditation procedure

- 1 coordinating agency responsible for the procedure
- Agencies of other consortium countries can be involved:
 - Being informed on procedure and outcomes
 - Proposing additional national criteria
 - Proposing an expert for panel
 - Sending an observer to the site visit
- The totality of the joint programme is assessed
- 1 international panel; 1 site visit; 1 report

JOQAR assessment framework

Shared European component

• Criteria and procedure agreed by coordinating agencies

(Additional national components)

 Necessary (legal) criteria and procedural aspects added by other involved agencies

Decision

- By coordinating agency
- Accepted by involved agencies

Additional national components problematic

Too many <u>national criteria and</u> <u>national requirements</u> in external QA/accreditation of joint programmes

- Sometimes not about quality
- Not suited for joint programmes
- Contradict each other

Very long list of examples:

- The assessment report (expert report) is required to be in the national language;
- National QA agencies which are not allowed to coordinate an international procedure / undertake a site visit abroad;
- Master thesis: "max. 30 ECTS credits" vs. "at least 35% of the total number of credits";

Outcomes evaluation of pilots

- Evaluated positively by the joint programme coordinators, experts, coordinating agencies and ECA
- Joint programmes welcome: advantage of 1 procedure; recommendations are beneficial for them
- Many decisions taken; decision-making phase ongoing
- European criteria viewed positively
- Remove additional national criteria for JPs
- Role of Coordination Point should be strengthened
- Pool of trained experts for single procedures of JPs

Coordination Point for Joint Programmes

Conclusions of feasibility study:

- There is a demand amongst both the joint programmes and the QA agencies for a coordination point regarding joint programmes
- Main focus of the coordination point should be the provision of information and the coordination of single accreditation procedures
- ECA is prepared to provide the coordination point for joint programmes

- Lists all accredited institutions and programmes in several European countries
- Provides standardised information on accreditation results
- Search engine
